Cucumber & Tomato Salad
4 seedless cucumber, peeled or
unpeeled
1 pint cherry tomatoes, quartered
½ an onion, diced
Juice of one lemon
3 Tbs. parmesan cheese (optional)
1 Tbs. olive oil
1 tps. salt
¾ tps. black pepper

½ c. fresh basil, finely chopped (or 1Tb. dried basil if you don't have fresh basil)

Combine all ingredients.
